Take your first right into the parking area of the Trinity Church and enter the church from the back door off the parking lot.

Northboro Center is centrally located: From the north or Worcester: Take Route 290 to the "Church Street" exit and head south, follow Church Street to Northbrough Center. From the east, this is the second set of exits from Route 495 and a left turn at the bottom of the exit ramp. From the west, this is the exit after the Route 140 exits in Shrewsbury and a turn right at the bottom of the exit ramp. From Marlboro: Follow Route 20 East to Northbrough Center. From Westbrough: Take Route 9 to the "Route 135 North" exit and follow to Northbrough Center. From Shrewsbury: Follow Route 20 East to Northbrough Center.

Engineering Society Contributions to Education

Several engineering societies, the IEEE, and specifically the Worcester County Section have made significant contributions to the education of the nation's youth, recognizing that they are the future citizens, scientists and engineers in an ever more technical society. To that end, several entities have arisen which are supported by engineering societies and universities, all relying on volunteers.

Locally, two developments have been functioning for several years. "RESEED" (Retirees Enhancing Science Education through Experiments and Demonstrations) was originated at Northeastern University and was described at a PACE meeting in March of 1995. "The Transformations Project" is one directly supported by the IEEE Foundation and in which the Worcester County Section has been participating for several years. Both "RESEED" and "The Transformations Project" link engineers and scientists with middle school teachers and students to improve science teaching in the middle school classroom.

One of the ventures which the Worcester County Section has supported through a grant and classroom volunteers is the "Junior Solar Sprint". This year we have expanded that support from one to three schools. The "Junior Solar Sprint" is an annual competition in which 7th and 8th grade students design, build and race model cars powered by solar energy. Volunteers, which include engineers and scientists, work with the teachers and students developing a creative environment. The students are only provided with a motor and a solar panel. They must develop the vehicle using their own creativity under specific racing and construction guidelines. They are also encouraged to use mathematics and scientific principles. Object Oriented Libraries, and Programming 32-bit Delphi

The topics they will discuss include inheritance and information-hiding; design-time visual forms vs. dynamic forms; utilizing units to organize a large project; the Windows API and message handling. The presentation will deal with their experiences and insights gained moving OWL to Delphi 2.0.

The second presentation this month will focus on programming 32-bit Delphi. Ian Sharp, our seminar instructor from Database Programmers Retreat, will discuss upgrading 16 bit Delphi applications to 32 bit applications, maintaining 16 and 32 bit code, and identify the major Win32 differences Delphi developers need to be aware of.
