The Trinity Church is located at 23 Main Street in Northboro, Mass. (in Northboro, Main Street is also Route 20), one block east from Northboro Center. Northboro Center is at the intersections of Main Street, Route 135, and Church Street.

From Northboro Center, head east for one block and take the first left after the railroad tracks. This left will be between an Exxon gas station on the left and the "Trinity Church" on the right. Take your first right into the parking area of the Trinity Church and enter the church from the back door off the parking lot.

Northboro Center is centrally located:

From the north or Worcester: Take Route 290 to the "Church Street" exit and head south, follow church Street to Northboro Center. From the east, this is the second set of exits from Route 495 and a left turn at the bottom of the exit ramp. From the west, this is the exit after the Route 140 exits in Shrewsbury and a turn right at the bottom of the exit ramp. From Marlboro: Follow Route 20 East to Northboro Center. From Westboro: Take Route 9 to the "Route 135 North" exit and follow to Northboro Center. From Shrewsbury: Follow Route 20 East to Northboro Center.

I hope to see many of you there. Registration is not required but I really want to get some idea of how many of you will be attending so we can have sufficient refreshments. I want this to be a great time for all. If you know

There's GOLD In Them Thar Hills!!

The first GOLD meeting for Boston and Worcester County Sections will be held this January!

What the dickens is GOLD? GOLD stands for Graduates Of the Last Decade, and it was created by the Membership Development Committee. It is pretty much an equivalent to PACE's YP (Young Professionals) program with the exception that, while both can target recent graduates, GOLD is indiscriminate of age - if you have received any degree in the last 10 years, you are considered a GOLD member!

Why is GOLD important? Both the GOLD and YP programs were designed to retain recently graduated Student Members as continuing and active members of the IEEE. Our GOLD meetings are open to anyone who cares to attend - and most especially, STUDENT members are encouraged to attend. What is interesting or applicable to a GOLD member is most likely interesting or applicable to anyone in any age group.

So what? Let me toss out an amazing statistic: only 17% of graduating Student Members are still members just a short four years after graduation!! There are several possible reasons for this severe decline, including full-member-priced-dues, financial burdens (like student loans) and the change of demands for time and on lifestyle commitments.

IEEE's Financial Advantage Program, the Graduated Dues program (available to graduating students), personal networking, and obtaining mentors (not to mention all of the world-class IEEE publications!), could help retain some of these recent graduates, but only if they are informed and supported by those of us who are willing to take the time and effort to include recent graduates of all ages.

The GOLD program was designed to facilitate this desire to help these recent graduates and second career individuals and demonstrate to them the great many benefits IEEE can offer.

Where and When: The meeting will be held on

Refreshments and lunch will be served.

What: The topic for this first GOLD meeting will be contracting/consulting vs. permanent employment.

- A brief introduction of the GOLD program and IEEE will start off the agenda to aquaint attendees with the main sponsor of the meeting.
- Each of the speakers will briefly present (~10 min) how his/her career path decision was made and how things have progressed since.
- A question and answer session to follow the presentations.

Can Solar Energy be Competitive in a Deregulated Energy Market

The annual joint dinner meeting of the IEEE and ASME will be held on February 5, 1998 on the campus of Worcester Polytechnic Institute. The optional dinner will be at the Higgins House and the presentation will be at Perreault Lecture Hall.

The presentation this year will relate to the viability of electric generation from solar energy. The sun is regarded as the ultimate clean and renewable source of energy. So, why hasn't solar energy played a more significant role in replacing our more traditional, non-renewable energy sources such as coal and natural gas? Dr. Beckman will discuss the basic technology for transforming solar energy into useful forms. The technology of heating and cooling with solar energy is conceptually simple and real breakthroughs are not expected. On the other hand, electricity production from solar energy is a high technology endeavor. The promising technologies are either direct conversion with photovoltaic devices, or solar-thermal with heat operated power plants. The question to be addressed is "Can Solar Energy be Competitive in a Deregulated Energy Market?"
